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Economic Outlook Survey Results Indicate Some Optimism

The Chamber recently completed a survey of its members to determine their outlook on the economy. The survey completed May 5th is the eighth semiannual survey conducted in the past four years and had 304 responses from 1465 email invitations (a return rate of 21%). Significant results and how they compare to past surveys are shown below:

- With regard to the national economy, 23% viewed it as stable, which is identical to the survey results from one year ago but significantly higher than the 11% response in November of 2011.
- When asked about the local economy, 26% viewed it as stable, a number higher than either the spring 2011 response (21%) or the Fall 2011 response (23%). The trend is that local business owners are feeling increasingly that the recession has bottomed out in the Grand Valley.
- In terms of factors that will most impact local businesses in the next six months, consumer confidence was cited the most often (40%) in all three surveys. Energy prices which were a significant concern last fall (33%), have receded to the third most often cited factor (26%) this spring, behind perceptions of a weak economy (33%). Respondents were allowed to select up to three answers for this question.
- Company sales expectations for the next six months indicated that 37% expected sales to increase slightly higher than the response noted on the fall 2011 survey (34%) and

in

about the same as one year ago (36%).

- For the first time in the survey's history less than 50% indicated that they intended to delay capital expenditures (46%) for the next six months due to the economy. Over 50% of respondents were expecting to delay expenditures in both of the previous surveys.
- Employment numbers are improving with 22% or at least one in five companies indicating that they will be increasing employment levels in coming months and only 11% indicating they will be decreasing the number of employees. Last fall, 17% were increasing employment and 14% were decreasing employment. In the spring of 2011, 19% were increasing employment and 15% were predicting a decrease in employment.
- 34% of respondents are more optimistic now than they were six months ago about economic conditions, compared with only 24% in the fall of 2011.
- Most respondents now expect that the local economy will begin to significantly recover in 2013 (42%), but one in five (20%) indicated that they think it has already begun.

something they could not have foreseen when they started their coursework a few years ago. High schools graduated about 1,000 students in the Grand Valley. For the Chamber, that means it is you, the businesses that create the jobs and employ these graduates.

As the committee continues to look at the issues and the opportunities associated with building the future workforce, it is paramount that we be able to answer the key question of "What's in it for the business?" It will take real effort and real time (something we are all short of) for businesses to engage with today's students in a meaningful way. We must be able to produce some tangible benefits for not just the students but for area employers as well.

Grant Funds Available for Training Your Workforce

The State of Colorado was awarded \$5 million in October of last year to raise the technical skill levels of workers here and elsewhere in the United States and to reduce the number of foreign workers that are being brought into the United States taking high skill high paying jobs.

Training can take many forms including;

- Industry-identified skill upgrade training
- Classroom, online/distance, customized training strategies
- On-site and at local training institutions
- Short-term certificate programs
- Longer term degree completion coursework in limited cases

Companies are required to match the grant funds dollar for dollar, but can include the employee's salary and other costs in the match.

Only certain occupations are eligible for the grant and a list is shown below:

• Information Technology (NAICS: 51): Computer/

Information Systems Managers; Computer and Information Scientists, Research; Computer Programmers; Computer Programmers, non R&D; **Computer Software** Engineers; Applications, **Computer Software** Engineers, Systems Software; Computer Systems Analysts; Network & Computer Systems Administrators (incl. Computer Security Specialists); Database Administrators; Computer

Specialists, All Other (includes web developers and administrators); Network Systems & Data; Communications Analysts; Computer Support Specialists; Computer Hardware Engineers.

- STEM Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services (NAICS: 54): Engineering Managers; Mechanical Engineers; Electrical Engineers; Electronics Engineers; Except Computer; Chemical Engineers; Engineers, All Other; Biomedical Engineers; Materials Engineers; Engineers, all other; Physicists; Atmospheric and Space Scientists.
- Advanced Manufacturing (NAICS: 31-33): General & Operations Managers; Industrial Production Managers, Quality Control; Industrial Engineers; Logisticians; Commercial & Industrial Designers.
